Book Review Guidelines

The *Asia-Pacific Journal of International Humanitarian Law* is a peer-reviewed academic journal, produced by the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and the University of the Philippines Institute of International Legal Studies. First published in 2005, the Journal showcases scholarly articles, book reviews, and commentary on significant developments in International Humanitarian Law, and related fields, with a special focus on the Asia-Pacific region. It is published once a year, in print and online.

Authors interested in reviewing a book or suite of books, or recommending a book for review should address proposals for contributions to the attention of the Managing Editor, Prof. Rommel Casis, through asiapacificjournalonihl@gmail.com, with the subject line: Book Review Proposal. Notifications for accepted proposed contributions will be communicated as soon as practicable.

Book reviews should be approximately 1,500-2,500 words, submitted in a Word document (Size 12 font, Times New Roman, 1.5 line spacing). Book review essays on a suite of books may be comprised of 2,500-3,000 words.

All book reviews should be prepared in accordance with the Journal's general Guidelines for Authors.

In drafting a book review, authors are asked to briefly summarize the principal features of the book, challenges and innovations posed to current thinking on the subject, and recommendations for further topics or areas of research, among others.

The editorial team reserves the right to make a decision on publishing the book review upon receipt of the complete draft, and may suggest revisions prior thereto.
